Dear Colonel Gomes:

In our past telephone conversation you expressed interest in knowing what savings might accrue to the government in the event that the last input of 38 trainees, scheduled under the above-referenced contract to start their training at Yale on April 1, 1965, were not sent to Yale.

The reduction in cost which would be experienced by the University in such event and which could be passed on to the government in the form of reduced billing under the contract would stem primarily from the fact that all training would cease by August 19, 1965, the date of graduation of the most recent input of trainees who started their training on January 5, 1965. We estimate the saving in training costs at about \$20,000. In addition, the government would not incur the per capita fee of \$177.47 for training materials, etc. For the 38 students scheduled to start training April 5, 1965, this would amount to \$6,743.86.

As you know, the amount of the current contract, \$438,192, includes \$60,000 for dormitory accommodations at the rate of \$5,000 per month for the twelve months July 1, 1964 through June 30, 1965. If you plan to send us the final input now scheduled for April 1, 1965, it is clear that we shall have to make some further fiscal provision for dormitory accommodations for the period July 1, 1965 through November, 1965. In the event that you decide not to send this last input, we will be pleased to recommend that the University waive any charge for dormitory accommodations provided from and after July 1, 1965. This would be a further source of savings.

With respect to your interest in the possibility of acquiring equipment which is used in the training program, there is one piece of equipment, a Gredemaster Electronic Scoring Machine, which the University purchased for \$1,495.00, which we would be pleased to sell to the government for a mutually agreeable price.

You also inquired about teaching materials. The University is willing to turn over to the government without charge, but with the government to meet costs of packing and shipment to wherever they are to be sent, the following categories of teaching materials:

- (a) the plates or masters for, and all existing stocks of, duplicated or printed materials prepared exclusively for use in Air Force classes;
- (b) existing supplies of specialized test forms, grading sheets, and similar materials used exclusively in the Air Force program;
- (c) existing stock of tape copies of lessons used for issue to Air Force students;
- (d) all master tapes containing material used exclusively in the Air Force program or collected for potential use in the Air Force program (e.g. off-the-air tapes of Voice of America broadcasts); and
- (e) two copies of any master tapes containing materials used in our own academic and non-academic civilian programs which may be useful to the Air Force program. (The government would also have right, which we give to anyone who purchases copies of these tapes, to use these copies as masters for the production of further copies.)

We judge from your letter of January 7th that you are not optimistic about being able to transfer from Yale the final input of 38 trainees. As soon as you know definitely about this, please let us know and advise what steps we should take to arrange for an amendment of the contract to cover the cost of dormitory accommodations for July-November.
